

The sensing element of Figaro gas sensors is a tin dioxide (SnO₂) semiconductor which has low conductivity in clean air. In the presence of a detectable gas, the sensor's conductivity increases depending on the gas concentration in the air. A simple electrical circuit can convert the change in conductivity to an output signal which corresponds to the gas concentration.

The TGS 816 is not only sensitive to a wide range of gases, it also has a ceramic base which can withstand severe environments up to 200°C. It has high sensitivity to methane, propane, and butane, making it ideal for natural gas and LPG monitoring. The sensor can detect a wide range of gases, making it an excellent, low cost sensor for a variety of applications.




The figure below represents typical sensitivity characteristics, all data having been gathered at standard test conditions (see reverse side of this sheet). The Y-axis is indicated as sensor resistance ratio (Rs/Ro) which is defined as follows:

> Rs = Sensor resistance of displayed gases at various concentrations Ro = Sensor resistance in 1000ppm methane


The figure below represents typical temperature and humidity dependency characteristics. Again, the Y-axis is indicated as sensor resistance ratio, defined as follows:

Rs = Sensor resistance at 1000ppm of methane at various temperatures/humidities Ro = Sensor resistance at 1000ppm of methane at 20°C and 65% R.H.

Temperature/Humidity Dependency:



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

(1) Sensing Element:

SnO2 is sintered to form a thick film on the surface of an alumina ceramic tube which contains an internal heater.

100 mesh SUS 316 double gauze


Pin Connection and Basic Measuring Circuit:

The numbers shown around the sensor symbol in the circuit diagram at the right correspond with the pin numbers shown in the sensor's structure drawing (above). When the sensor is connected as shown in the basic circuit, output across the Load Resistor (VRL) increases as the sensor's resistance (Rs) decreases, depending on gas concentration.
